GET THE FACTS. GET SCREENED.

- Mammograms are recommended for women ages 50 to 74 years old. Even if you feel fine or no one in your family has had breast cancer, it is important to get screened.
- Most women diagnosed with breast cancer have no family history of the disease.
- Most women will have normal mammogram results.
- More than 80% of breast cancers are found in women over the age of 50.

HOW EFFECTIVE ARE SCREENING MAMMOGRAMS?

While screening tests are not perfect, regular mammograms are the best way for women ages 50 to 74 to reduce the risk of dying from breast cancer.

Screening may miss some breast cancers and some cancers develop in the time between screens. This is one of the reasons why regular screening is important.

Some breast cancers that appear on a mammogram may never progress to the point where a woman has symptoms. Therefore, some women may have surgery or treatment for a breast cancer that would never have been life-threatening.

Not all cancers found through screening can be cured.
