Regimens where one or more drugs are not approved by Health Canada for any indication will be identified under Rationale and Use.

B - Drug Regimen

Philadelphia Chromosome (Ph) negative adult patients, age <60 years:

<u>vinCRIStine</u>	2 mg	IV	Day 1
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DOXOrubicin 30 mg /m² IV Day 1

mercaptopurine 50 mg/m² PO Days 1 to 14

Intrathecal Treatment (methotrexate + cytarabine + hydrocortisone):

methotrexate	12 ma	П	Days 1, 4, 8, 11

and

cytarabine 40 mg Γ Days 1, 4, 8, 11

and

hydrocortisone 15 * mg Γ Days 1, 4, 8, 11

(Methotrexate, cytarabine and hydrocortisone can be admixed in the same syringe. Also refer to local protocols.)

The regimen details vary based on Ph status and patient age. Refer to local protocols.
